Places to Eat

Hawaii has something for every palate—whether you're craving homemade shortbread cookies or a succulent fish taco. My top dining recommendations include everything from breakfast joints to what is, without question, the best restaurant on the island.

Hawaiian Style Cafe. The cafe's signature 12-inch pancakes are as delicious as they are huge—but that's not all this local favorite has to offer. From its old-time vibe to its excellent service, the cafe is a shining example of Big Island hospitality. Manago Hotel. Perched on the slopes of Mauna Loa, this historic, 100-year- old hotel offers panoramic views of the Kealakekua Bay. It's also home to the Manago Hotel Restaurant and its famous pork chops with brown gravy and onions.
